Carpark Barrier Arm

Finally, the barrier arm arrived and was installed reasonably quickly. It is certainly much lighter and easier to manouevre using the same key as the bollards

Barrier Arm Keys

After some discussion it has been decided to hold both the keys for the barrier arm and the chapel door in the basement of the Chapel. The basement door is on the right-hand side of the chapel when facing the street. Using the code pad please use the same code numbers as the Chapel code except with a C in front of the numbers. The key is on the wall just inside the basement on the left. Please make sure you return the key to the basement, check the door is locked and the numbers on the code pad are scrambled. We hope this will mean less time is spent having to park your car and go to the orderly's lodge to collect the key. A set of keys will remain at the orderly's lodge as a backup.

Heritage Festival: Florence meets Arts and Crafts

About 230 people visited the Chapel over five Open Days. They admired the beautifully restored interior, stained glass windows and the Arts and Crafts furniture. The Marquette story attracted much interest. Diana Francis -Casey worked with Alex Rutherford (Airforce Museum, Wigram). He made a "made to measure" mannequin and the bust was kindly lent by the Cotter Medical History Trust.



An excellent slide show by Beth Wynn Williams and Jude Turner's story about Florence portrayed fascinating details about her life. Sue Claridge's wonderful display of stamps and other ephemera was full of information.

The provenance of some instruments in the Chapel was verified. They were given by Florence Nightingale to Mary Ann Vousden in 1890 on the eve of her departure for New Zealand.

Our condolences to the family of the late Janet Drury (née Williamson) who died recently.

Mrs Drury was the niece of Janet Wyse Mackie Williamson, the first New Zealand nurse to be awarded the Royal Red Cross (RRC).

Mrs Drury's interest in the Chapel is continued by her daughter, Julie Stewart. Julie sent a lovely photograph of her great aunt.

Janet Williamson is wearing her RRC, the Queen's South African medal, and a gold and red enamel gold medal given to her by the Otago and Southland Patriotic Committee for services in the South African War.

The gold medal and JWM Williamson's Nursing Registration medal, on loan from the family, are on display in the museum.

Text from Kai Tiaki Nurses Journal 1 January 1919



Nurse Hilda Hooker, a pupil nurse at Christchurch Hospital in her second year, was another who lost her life at this time, cutting short a promise of great usefulness.



Nurse Grace Beswick, of the Christchurch Hospital, who had not long completed her training, was also a victim of influenza. This young nurse was a sister of Sister Beswick, A.R.R.R.C., who recently returned from active service, and had just been detailed to duty the Chalmers at

Orthopedic Hospital, so that she was able to be with her sister at this sad time.
